## ALL THINGS GROW WITH LOVE

What a fun January! The children seemed happy to be back from winter break and I know I was really happy to see them! It is amazing to me how much they have grown since the start of the school year. Their confidence and independence seem to have increased tenfold. I love seeing them show you where things need to go, putting on their coats on their own and proudly carrying their backpacks. It also makes my heart so happy to hear stories from their teachers about all the progress they are seeing in their classrooms. Be confident to know that your child is growing as an individual and learning many lifelong skills such as honesty, respect, focus, problem solving, teamwork and kindness at school. We are excited to continue to partner with you on your child's journey towards higher cognitive, social, emotional and language development!

This month's Parent Information board is focused on how preschool is helping to set the foundation for math. In the class, we work on the following types of skills: Counting orally, naming numerals, spatial location, sorting, seriation, matching numerals to quantities, identifying shapes, counting 1 to 1 , subitizing and creating and finishing patterns. Are seriation and subitize new terms to you? Seriation is ordering objects by size, location or position. The ability to subitize is just being able to instantly recognize an amount of objects (up to 5), without counting them. A great example would be recognizing the numbers on a dice without counting the dots. If you would like to know more, take a moment to check out the information board which is located right before you enter the preschool wing. Are you a parent that doesn't drop off and pick up? Did you know that at Hope Ridge Preschool your child is also engaging in Heggerty Phonological Awareness lessons? Phonological awareness allows children to recognize and work with sounds of language. These activities are sometimes called ear exercises because the focus is on hearing the parts or sounds in words. In the beginning weeks of instruction, your child was engaged in lessons for "Setting the Stage" to help them learn about listening for sounds. During this time, they started to develop an understanding of the language play activities they will be participating in. Your child will then continue on to work with words, syllables, and sounds they hear in words.

Why is Phonological Awareness Important? Phonological awareness is a strong predictor of reading success. It is especially important at the earliest stages of reading development and is the foundation for reading. Phonological awareness is simple to support at home - all you need is language! Help your child understand that the words they hear in speech are made up of parts and sounds. During the remainder of the school year, we will share in upcoming newsletters or flyers, ideas of games or "ear exercises" that you can play with your child.

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I. Teach your child the word-prediction When you are driving through town, ask him to make predictions about things you will see. For instance, "Make a prediction - Will the stoplight be red or green?" When you see the answer, comment on whether your predictions were correct.
2. Place a few drops of vanilla extract on a cotton ball and invite your child to smell It. Ask, "What is that smell?" Repeat the activity with peppermint extract, perfume, or other recognizable smells.
3. Lay five Hershey's kisses \{or pom poms or coins..\} in front of your child. Count the kisses out loud with him. Then ask your child to close his eyes while you take away several of the kisses. When he opens his eyes, ask how many kisses are missing. Play several rounds to help him work on number decomposition he'll use for subtraction later.
4. Send your child on a shape hunt. Draw a shape on a plece of paper. Then invite your child to run around the house gathering objects that match that shape. For instance, if you drew a rectangle, your child could grab a Lego, a book and a piece of paper. Draw a new shape and send him off again.
5. Read the book "If You Give a Mouse a Valentine"by Laura Numeroff. Then help your child make a valentine for a special family member or friend.
6. Since Valentine's Day is about friendship, help your child learn how to write a friend's name. Write the name in yellow marker on a plece of paper. Then have your child trace over the letters with different colors of crayons.
7. Fold the end of an empty paper towel roll into the shape of a heart. Give the roll to your child along with a dish of paint and several pleces of paper. Invite him to dip the heart into the paint and stamp it on the paper.
8. Write the word friend on a plece of paper. Work together to count the number of letters it has, name the first sound in the word, list other words that start with the letter $f$, and brainstorm rhyming words like bend, lend, send, pretend
9. Help your child name the names of body parts and work on fine motor skills. Give him a box of Band-Aids. Call out a body part where he has a pretend boo-boo. Have him unwrap the Band-Aid and place it on that body part. Continue naming and bandaging body parts until he loses interest.
10. Help your child strengthen fine motor skills he'll use for writing later. Draw a heart on a plece of paper. Give it to your child along with a sheet of stickers. Invite him to stick the stickers along the line so that he's tracing the heart.
